



New Friends New Life restores and empowers formerly trafficked girls and sexually exploited women and their children.

By providing access to education, job training, interim financial assistance, mental health and spiritual support, New Friends New Life helps women and their children overcome backgrounds of abuse, addiction, poverty and limited opportunities.

WOMEN'S PROGRAM

Offers financial support for basic living, budget coaching, case management, parenting classes, continued education, life-skills training, spiritual support, outreach to incarcerated women, and the opportunity to participate in the protégé leadership team.

CHILDREN & YOUTH PROGRAM

Offers individual counseling, academic tutoring, mentoring and partnering with school counselors, and provides meals and childcare while mothers participate in other programs at New Friends New Life.

HIGH-RISK & TRAFFICKED TEEN GIRLS PROGRAM

Offers sexual abuse recovery groups for adolescent girls within Letot Girls' Center and the Dr. Jerome McNeil, Jr. Detention Center. Teaches girls, ages 12 to 17, how to define, recognize, and ultimately recover from abuse. The program is an intervention and prevention effort to help girls avoid a lifetime of exploitation as a human trafficking victim.

RESOURCE CENTER

A dedicated space where women leaving the sex industry can get started on a plan toward life change by taking advantage of technology resources, educational materials and classes, practical skills development courses for life and work, personal improvement opportunities, and social service support.


COUNSELING SERVICES

Includes individual and group sessions for women and their children involving art therapy, animal-assisted therapy, and psycho-educational group sessions. The counseling department conducts mental health evaluations and partners with pro-bono psychiatric care providers.


SECOND CHANCE JOB PROGRAM

Helps women with limited work experience transition into conventional employment. Businesses may participate in internships, temporary assignments, or permanent placements. New Friends New Life subsidizes part-time internships at local non-profits.



BRIANA'S STORY

After her experience of abuse and recovery, Brianna wants to get this message out about at risk and sex trafficked girls, "We are not bad. We went through certain things to make us who we are, and we just need help to get back on the right track."

Brianna was in Kindergarten when she started experiencing episodes of violent sexual abuse from her father. When he was incarcerated for his sex crimes, Brianna moved in with her mother, a drug addict with a series of boyfriends who continued the cycle of abuse.

Brianna first used drugs with her mother. "When I saw her doing it, I got curious. And I decided to try it with my mom."

It was her mother's addiction that resulted in her being sold to a sex trafficker for drugs.

At age 17, Brianna was arrested as a runaway and finally received help through a new juvenile detention outreach program developed by New Friends New Life. While incarcerated, she participated in weekly group therapy and contacted New Friends New Life for follow-up services after being released.




Referring to her work with the New Friends New Life sexual abuse support group, she says, "If you know you have a past that needs to be heard and you need to tell your story, this is the group to go to. It builds up your self-esteem. You are not just some victim or a girl who has been abused. You are way more than that."
